During this time, approximately 630 high school students with an interest in music education have come through this program. One of the great aspects of returning to Peoria each year is seeing former FMES students attending as collegiate members, and more than ever we are seeing previous FMES students as music teachers throughout Illinois.

As these past participants have moved into the field and become professional music educators, they have also become a valuable resouce to the FMES program. The opportunity to speak with former FMES students and veteran music educators has become a favorite element of the program for current high school participants:
